A typical session in Nursery

8:30/12:15	Arrive, Register and Carpet Time
9:00/12:45	Choosing Time
9:30/1:30	Maths and Snack Time
10:00/1:45	Outside/ Phonics
10:45/2:30	Choosing Time
11:00/2:45	Carpet Time
11:15/3:00	Story/Song and Home Time

30-hour week

In Nursery we offer some places with 30-hour provision per week. If you are eligible and we have availability you will be entitled to a 3-hour session in the morning (8:30-11:30) and a 3-hour session in the afternoon (12:15-15:15). The lunchtime period is from 11:30-12:15 and

is an extra to your entitlement. As a result, there is a charge of £3 per day and you will need to provide sandwiches and an additional drink. Please be aware that we are a Nut-Free School.

15-hour week

The 15-hour provision is available for five mornings (8:30-11.30) or afternoons (12:15-15:15) in a week. An overview of the session is above.

Snack information

The children will be encouraged to eat a fresh piece of fruit and a carton of milk each day. The children will also need to have a refillable water bottle with their name attached to the front.



Allergy/medical information

Please let us know if your child has any medical or food allergies before starting Nursery. If your child needs any form of medication then please complete one of our consent forms and return it to the school office where it will be stored on record. Our curriculum includes lots of food tasting experiences and we want to make sure everyone can take part! Please be aware that we are a Nut-Free School and have a policy in place.

Curriculum

Most of the teaching is completed in smaller groups with lots of free-flow opportunities (or choosing time). The Nursery classroom is open planned and joins onto Reception so the children are part of the Early Years Foundation Stage unit (EYFS).

During your child's time in Nursery they will be taught by a **qualified teacher** who will be supported by a Teaching Assistant.

We will provide your child with a broad and balanced curriculum that provides opportunities for first-hand experience and learning through play to enthuse, Excite and inspire all children in all areas of learning.

Communication



We share lots of information on the **Class Dojo** which is how we communicate with parents. Please download this apps and ask for the joining code.

We also complete fortnightly '**Home School Diaries'** where some homework can be completed and the diary returned for the children to share. At times we ask the homework to be uploaded on Dojo.

The information for this will be included in the 'Home Pack'.

To praise positive behaviour and promote independence, we have **Lily Bear** who selects a child and spends the night at their house. The children can then draw, write and take photographs of the exciting things they do with Bernie and share them via Dojo. This allows for a speaking and listening opportunity with their friends



Outdoor Learning









To promote **early language**, we have developed our role play areas and outdoor environment. We also have a **Postman Pat reading area** which encourages the children to go inside and talk about new books.

Classroom Environment



We want our children to be **immersed in reading and writing** opportunities. The children enjoy spending time in our reading garden inside the classroom.



What do the toilets look like?



We often get asked what the toilets look like. Our toilets are designed for Nursery children and we actively encourage the children to be independent at going by themselves and washing their own hands.

Areas of Learning

There are seven areas of learning and development that must shape educational programmes in early year's settings. All areas of learning and development are important and inter-connected. Three areas are particularly crucial for igniting children's curiosity and enthusiasm for learning, and for building their capacity to learn, form relationships and thrive.

These three prime areas are;

- 1. Communication and language;
- 2. Physical development
- 3. Personal, social and emotional development.

Providers must also support children in four specific areas, through which the three prime areas are strengthened and applied. The specific areas are:

- Literacy;
- Mathematics;
- Understanding the world;
- Expressive arts and design.

Communication and language development involves giving children opportunities to experience a rich language environment; to develop their confidence and skills in expressing themselves; and to speak and listen in a range of situations.



Physical development involves providing opportunities for young children to be active and interactive; and to develop their co-ordination, control, and movement, fine motor skills are a focus too, to ensure children can use and control tools including pens and pencils. Children must also be helped to understand the importance of physical activity, and to make healthy choices in relation to food.



Personal, social and emotional development involves helping children to develop a positive sense of themselves, and others; to form positive relationships and develop respect for others; to develop social skills and learn how to manage their feelings; to understand appropriate behaviour in groups; and to have confidence in their own abilities.



Mathematics involves providing children with opportunities to develop and improve their skills in counting, understanding and using numbers, calculating simple addition and subtraction problems; and to describe shapes, spaces, and measurement. Children are encouraged to apply what they know to everyday problems.

Literacy development involves encouraging children to link sounds and letters and to begin to read and write. Children must be given access to a wide range of reading materials (books, poems, and other written materials) to ignite their interest. In Nursery we spend lots of time retelling stories.



Understanding the world involves guiding

children to make sense of their physical world and their community through opportunities to explore, observe and find out about people, places, technology and the environment.



Expressive arts and design

involves enabling children to explore and play with a wide range of media and materials, as well as providing opportunities and encouragement for sharing their thoughts, ideas and feelings through a variety of activities in art, music, movement, dance, roleplay, and design and technology.
